Baseball

- Text and Graphics
 - 1864 and 1866 – Baseball is introduced to the Island
 - 1878 – Cuban League is formed (world's second oldest professional baseball organization)
 - 1891 – The first U.S. big leaguers toured Cuba
 - The Spanish insistence on Bullfighting instead of Baseball



Cuba National Teams' Jerseys (pre-1960)

- Jerseys from 1948, 1951, 1952, 1954 and 1959
- 1951 Jersey was worn by Gonzalo Naranjo who appeared on “What’s My Line” accompanied by that film clip. Also included: a medal he was awarded during the 1951 World Amateur Baseball Tournament

U.S. Farm System in Cuba

- Habana Cubans (Single A Team for the Washington Senators from 1946 through 1953)
- Habana Sugar Kings (Triple A Team for the Cincinnati Reds from 1954 through 1960) jersey and warm-up jacket Raul Sanchez wore the year the Sugar Kings won the Minor League World Series



MAJOR LEAGUERS OF CUBAN HERITAGE

Jerseys worn by Cubans in other non-U.S. countries:

- Japan 1972, worn by former Major Leaguer Tony Gonzalez
- Guatemala 1980s, manager jersey worn by Juan Izaguirre (who played professional ball in pre-Castro Cuba)
- Columbia 1996, manager jersey worn by former Major Leaguer Paul Casanova (Hank Aaron's roommate)
- Venezuela 2002, worn by former Major Leaguer Alexis (Alex) Sánchez

Jerseys worn by Cubans or players of Cuban heritage in the Major Leagues

- Raul Sanchez – 1960 Cincinnati Reds jersey (only player to play in all four Cuban professional teams, and both farm teams in Cuba and U.S. Major League)
- Bert Campaneris – 1964 Oakland A's rookie jersey
- Marcelino Lopez – 1967 Angels jersey (Lopez, a pitcher, was Sporting News Rookie of the Year)
- Pedro (Tony) Oliva – 1967 and 1973 jerseys (3-time batting champion and Rookie of the Year for Minnesota Twins) also included is Oliva baseball card depicting him wearing the 1973 jersey that is represented in the exhibit
- José Tartebull – 1969 Oakland A's vest and KC Royals Coaches jersey
- Pedro “Preston” Gomez- 1969 San Diego Padres jersey (called Preston because he once played for the Preston Mining Team)
- Zoilo Versailles – 1969 American League MVP (includes pants and Cuban AAU application written at age 17)
- Orlando Peña – 1969 Oakland A's vest
- Atanasio (Tony) Pérez – 1975 Cincinnati Reds green St. Patrick's Day jersey
- Luis Tiant – 1975 Boston Red Sox jersey (his father was a Negro League ballplayer)
- Danny Tartabull – 1989 KC Royals jersey (U.S.-born son of José Tartebull)
- José Cardinal – 1995 Cardinals Coaches jersey (was also Major Leaguer)
- Angel Hernandez – 1996 umpire jersey
- Miguel Cuellar – 1996 “Old Timers” Baltimore Orioles jersey

Separate Case

- José Canseco jerseys and memorabilia spanning his entire career (including 30/30 base)
- Osvaldo (Ozzie) Canseco jerseys

- Edmundo (Sandy) Amorós memorabilia including 2 jerseys, spikes and American flag that flew over Yankee Stadium when he made his famous catch in the 1955 World Series


- Orestes (Minnie) Miñoso (Mr. White Sox) memorabilia (from Cuba and U.S.)

Separate Case

- 1936 Most Popular Player Handbill featuring Martín Dihigo, who was known as the most “complete” player to ever exist. A Negro Leaguer, he never could play in the U.S. Major League because of his skin color. In 1977 he was admitted to the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

The Defectors

- René Arocha – 1997 San Francisco Giants jersey, his childhood jersey and jersey from Ciudad Habana (the first true defector)
- Barbaro Garbay – 1986 Detroit Tigers jersey. He came over in the Mariel Boatlift so is not technically a defector, but rather is an exile
- Eddy Oropesa – His Cuban jersey that he wore when he defected by running out of the stadium during a game in Mexico
- Rey Ordoñez – 1996 New York Mets jersey
- Osvaldo Fernández – 1995 Rookie San Francisco Giants jersey as well as the bag he carried when he defected with Liván Hernández
- Ariel Prieto – 1996 Oakland Athletics jersey. Prieto signed with the A's for \$1 million and carried the check in his pocket all weekend because he had never seen a check and didn't know what do with it!
- Eli Marrero – 2002 St. Louis Cardinals jersey

- Orlando (El Duque) Hernández – His New York Yankees warm-up jacket and New York Mets Jersey

WOMEN'S AND NEGRO BASEBALL LEAGUES

All-American Girls Professional Baseball League Exhibit Case

- Ysora (Chico) del Castillo Photo and Baseball Hall of Fame Ring. Del Castillo played in Cuba and was one of 8 Cuban women in the legendary film "A League of their Own."
- 1926 Letter to Cuban AAU President asking permission for U.S. Western Bloomer Girls Team to play a tournament in Cuba


Negro League Baseball Case

- 1927 Coronado Rodrigues bat
- 1929 José Oliveras bat
- Rafael (Ray) Noble bat- the only signed game-used bat in existence. Noble played in the Cuban League, Negro League and Major League.
